We use none but French glass of the best quality. Ordinary Cases are set with double-thick crystal glass; and extra fine Cases for jewelers with plate glass when so ordered. The German silver which we use in the construction of frames and bars is also of the best quality, and will not tarnish like that of lower grades, and we use the

heaviest guages possible for our purposes. Our polishing is done by steam power, which gives a uniformity and brilliancy of surface not seen in hand work.

The lumber is assorted and kiln-dried. The doors and slides to Cases are all of hard wood, and paneled, to prevent warping.

Glass in Cases is so set that it is embedded in the putty and never allowed to rest with its sides or edges upon the hard wood frame. This precaution greatly reduces the risk upon their transportation.

We wish to call particular attention to the Patent Joints, which we use at all parts of the Cases where joints are needed. They are not made of a cheap material covered with plating, but are cast solid of bell metal, a material susceptible of high polish, easily kept clean, practically indestructible, and, to all appearances, the same after its use for generations. There are no glued joints in our Cases, and consequently they can stand the most variable climates without injury. All ends for Round Front Cases are of bent wood covered with metal, and are not, as in inferior Cases, a simple hollow metal shell.

Cases are securely boxed and packed by professional packers, and their transportation thus rendered as safe as possible. We release the railroad companies from responsibility for damage by breakage, and thus obtain the lowest possible rates, which customers have the benefit of.

We are the inventors of, and have in use, the only set of machinery in existence which can produce all sizes of Circular Metal Show Case Moldings for Circular and Round Front Show Cases.

We employ none but first-class mechanics, and the work is warranted in every respect.

The works are the most extensive of the kind in the United States, occupying the whole of a large four-story building. Cases are first-class in every particular, made from our own designs. It is a sufficient comment upon their general appearance and elegance to remark that the patterns are extensively copied by other makers throughout the land.

HOW GLASS SHOW CASES ARE MADE.

[From the Rochester Tribune's "Man About Town," March 18, 1882.] In writing up the various industries of Rochester, our "Man About Town" found the material for the present chapter at an establishment which has no duplicate in the United States. Although Rochester makes \$8,000,000 in shoes and \$9,000,000 in clothing annually, shoes are made at Lynn, Mass., and clothing in New York and Philadelphia. But no city in the country can boast of such an institution as the Rochester Show Case Works, situated at 196 State street, and occupying the greater portion of the large building constructed for manufacturing purposes by M. Briggs. The modest entrance and office convey no idea of the business conducted, or the amount of goods shipped to every State in the Union. The business prosperity of the past few years, and especially the revival of trade in the Southern States, has given this branch of the manufacturing interest an impetus almost marvelous. For a number of years Rochester Show Cases have had a reputation as standard as Rochester flour, Rochester flowers, Rochester shoes or Rochester clothing. The Stein Show Case was known throughout the country, and, compared with other makes, was possessed of recognized superiority. Farley & Hofman, who now manufacture these Cases, make a specialty of every known variety of Show Cases and concomitant store fixtures. Machinery plays an important part in the production of the goods. * The expert in the wood workers' art has undoubtedly admired the highly finished work upon the graceful and light, yet strong arms, which form the rounded frames of Show Cases that he may have noticed. These arms are made from straight grained wood, which, when passed through a molding machine, are placed in a tank into which is let very hot moist steam. When thoroughly steamed, and while as pliable as wire, they are fastened to wood forms and passed, in lots of one hun led or more, to the dry kilns below and thoroughly dried. Nothing but re-steaming will make the wood resume its original shape, and even that will not do it unless the ends are released from the Patent Joint which unites the parts. This joint is of Bell Metal highly polished, with a fixed screw which passes through the conjoined parts. On the reverse side is a sliding clutch with teeth, which are firmly embedded by turning the nut that There is no case on record where one of these connections ever came apart. Cases may be caps it. shivered to atoms but these joints hold to the last. In the cheaper grades they are made of cast iron but usually are of Bell Metal, brought to a high polish by emery, oil and buffing with an especial substance of the nature of rouge.

Lovers of fine mechanical work have often admired the perfection of finish, jointings and moldings of metallic frames for Cases and the uninitiated have undoubtedly wondered how it is done. The backing of the metal is of wood molding, which exactly fits a steel die of the required pattern. (See cut No. 20, page 15.) The metal is of the finest quality of white metal, having the best properties of silver and nickle combined, which comes in long strips of any width desired. The wood molding is passed into the die (which is set in a frame) and then the silver is pushed through upon the face of the molding. Both together are drawn through the die (a force of four or five horse power being necessary), which conforms the metal and imbeds it into the solid wood. It is then polished by machinery especially adapted for the purpose, and known to this house only. One of the recent uses of celluloid is for the manufacture of Show Case frames. Its positive durability, its susceptibility to high polish and coloring makes it very desirable. Cases are made in imitation of ivory, agate, or, what is more beautiful, tortoise shell, warranted to last for ages. They are fast superceding wood cases, although there is still a thriving trade in black walnut, ebony and, in fact, ash, which, for the time being, is extremely fashionable. There are fashions in Show Cases as well as in bonnets, though the old reliable Metal Cases are always in fashion. A popular Case that is largely in use is the "Round Front," the front glass being rounded, giving a better view of the inside than is attained in a Case with square frame. None but imported French glass is used and the firm are heavy consumers of the article, not only as manufacturers, but as jobbers to other Show Case makers. In fact, they job largely in Case supplies. To one firm they may sell simply arms, to another joints, to another the glass, to another the sliding doors. While a glass Show Case is not patentable, improved portions may be protected, as is the case with the joint and sliding doors. An interesting feature of this business is the shipping. There is seldom a breakage. When whole Cases are shipped the bottom of the Case is held to the top of the box by screws, so that to break the glass the box must be broken through. Cases are shipped to all parts of the country with as much safety as the commonest article of merchandise. Farley & Hofman have now at sea a vessel bringing them 1000 boxes of French glass. A small Case-maker would be obliged to pay a large advance on such glass as he would require for his work. The same is true of other material. There is as much variance in the prices as there is in the styles. Certain regular styles sell for such an amount per lineal foot, the catalogue aiding the purchaser in making his selections. Of course the large cities are the best markets, but there are innumerable towns and villages from which orders come. Although employing a large number of men, and increasing their facilities constantly, it is quite difficult to keep up with orders, so universally popular have the goods become.

The business is owned and controlled solely by Joseph Farley and John Hofman. The former is a well-known business man, and brings to the firm all the responsibility necessary for any obligations incurred. The latter has followed the profession since boyhood, having served seven years with the Stein Company, of which they are now the sole successors in the United States. The thoroughness and system with which everything is conducted is largely due to Mr. Hofman's experience and personal attention to the details. It is an important industry and contributes materially to the reputation of Rochester as a manufacturing city.
